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## **FROM THE PASTOR**



The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ are at the very heart of Christianity. The good news of the gospel is that God has acted in history to conquer evil and reconcile sinners to himself through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. For those who have been united with this Jesus – who have submitted to Him as savior and Lord – have been united with Him in the likeness of His death and will one day be united with Him in the likeness of His resurrection (Rom. 6:5). Lent, therefore, is about living out of our union with, and identity in, Christ. Lent is first and foremost about the gospel making its way deeper into our lives.

On the Christian calendar, Lent is the forty days beginning on Ash Wednesday (February 18<sup>th</sup>) and leading up to Easter Sunday (April 5<sup>th</sup>). Sundays themselves are not counted in these forty days, as they are generally set aside as days of renewal and celebration.

The number forty carries great biblical significance based on: the forty days of rain Noah and his family endured in the flood, the forty years Israel spent in the wilderness, Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness, the forty days Jesus spent on the earth after his resurrection, and so much more. Forty days has been used by God to represent a period of trial, testing, and preparation.

Likewise, Lent is a season of preparation and repentance during which we anticipate the death (Good Friday) and resurrection (Easter Sunday) of Jesus. It is this very preparation and repentance – aimed at grasping the intense significance of the crucifixion – that gives us a deep and powerful longing for the resurrection, the joy of Easter.

Lent is a journey to the cross: meditating on our sin and weakness, looking to Jesus as our perfect example and substitute, and being heightened in our worship of his victory over Satan, sin, and death. On the cross, Jesus took our place to appease God's righteous anger toward our sin and rebellion. He was separated from God so that we could experience union with God. He was crushed by God so that we could be adopted by God. He was raised with God so that we too might be raised with God. The drama of how this unfolded is the story of Lent.

The journey of Lent is to immerse ourselves in this grand story so that it might increase our appreciation of Easter and love for Jesus. May we mourn the darkness in our hearts and rejoice in the light of God who came into the world to save us!

## **FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT FOR MARCH 2015**

Thanks to your faithful stewardship, we can celebrate a number of accomplishments during the month of January 2015:

- Our Resident Bishop Mark Webb of the Upper New York Conference led our worship service on January 18. A special offering of \$419 was presented to the Bishop for his discretionary fund and the Africa 360 Project.
- The Salvation Army was given 26 pounds of groceries this month.
- All bills, including our Ministry Shares assessment, were paid in full and on time.
- The January Noisy Can Offering of \$120.20 was used for the Human Concerns Center of Oswego.

**Our January income** from pledges and the customary gifts of those who do not pledge were nearly \$700 less than projected and total income from all sources for January was over \$2,000 less than expected.

**January's total expenditures** for current expenses in all areas were nearly \$200 more than expected. Most expense areas spent less than was budgeted for the month. Our January income was about \$5,200 less than January's expenses. This was largely caused by an insurance premium payment of nearly \$3,600.

Contributions and fundraising for our **Capital Campaign** totaled \$1,059.73 for January.

**The members of the Finance & Stewardship Committee continue to be grateful for your faithful attention to the financial needs of our ministries.** Please remember that you can contribute to our Capital Campaign with a minimum of effort or expense on your part by:

- Depositing your unwanted used clothing in the collection shed behind the church
- Purchasing our commemorative Christmas ornaments and telling your friends and neighbors with a connection to our church or Minetto about them
- Using *Shop with Scrip* to purchase gift cards through our church account. Garry Visconti can answer questions about the program.

## Status Report of Capital Campaign Maintenance Projects

**Background.** A joint meeting of the Board of Trustees and the Finance & Stewardship Committee was held on August 22, 2012, to review a list of maintenance projects that had been drawn up for the Board of Trustees by Doug Buske and Rick VanPatten with input from others. The Trustees' objective was to anticipate the major needs for building maintenance into the foreseeable future in order to plan for the necessary financial resources.

The purpose of the August 22 meeting was to review available estimates of the costs of the projects, to begin to put them in a priority order, and to consider how to provide the necessary financial resources. Prioritizing the projects took into account the following considerations:

1. Safety and health of people using our buildings
2. Protection of our investment in the church and parsonage
3. Logical sequence of interrelated projects

The Church Council met on September 5, 2012, and decided unanimously to recommend to the Church Conference on September 16 that the prioritized list of projects be approved and that a capital campaign be undertaken to raise \$200,000 over the next three years.

A Church Conference, held on September 16, 2012, authorized the conduct of a three-year capital campaign to raise \$200,000 to cover the costs of the prioritized maintenance projects and to restore the reserve funds for future emergencies. The Trustees proceeded to acquire cost estimates from several possible contractors. Their findings and recommendations were discussed and approved at a Church Council meeting on October 21, 2012. The actual expenditures or approved estimates are shown below, updated to February 9, 2015.

**Status Report as of February 11, 2015.** It is no exaggeration to say that the first two years of our Capital Campaign have seen substantial improvements in our buildings — both the church and the parsonage.

Major water and mold problems have been eliminated from the sanctuary and parsonage, all of our church entrances have been made accessible for everyone, all of the windows of the education wing and several in the parsonage have been replaced with energy-efficient units, all fluorescent lighting has been upgraded to current standards, and the entire education wing has been cleaned and repainted. Along the way, several routine matters have been addressed, including replacing the parsonage refrigerator and water heater, refurbishing a bathroom in the parsonage, and repairing and re-carpeting around the two entrances to the education wing.

And through it all, our routine operating expenses and obligations to the Upper New York Conference have been paid in full and on time. All of this is testimony to the generosity and faithfulness of the people of this church

The following chart shows the prioritized improvements that remain to be done as well as those already completed. The unfinished projects include acoustical treatment of the dining room, sanctuary sound system, restoration of the organ, replacement of the education wing roof when needed, and restore a \$50,000 reserve fund for future emergencies. These are not insignificant matters but they will probably not cost as much as the work we have already done.

Consequently, we are asking the members of our congregation to consider extending their past commitments beyond 2015 or to make new commitments beyond this year so our maintenance work can continue on to completion.

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## The Backstitcher

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Our church quilters were a lovely group of elderly ladies. They met each Wednesday and quilted until noon when I, as their pastor, joined them for lunch.

When I observed their love for each other and the harmony in their group, I could not help but remember the words of the old hymn: “What a fellowship, what a joy divine . . . .”

As far as I could see, they had to deal with only one problem. They had a backstitcher in their group who sewed opposite of everyone else. Dear old Mrs. Bee was the guilty party.

Others in the fellowship tried to gently show her how to quilt correctly, but she never got the hang of it. She kept right on moving the thread incorrectly.

The group loved her and never considered banning her despite her backstitching. You see, they knew she headed the group. Quilting was about the only fellowship Mrs. Bee had in her life.

The problem with her stitching was handled lovingly. After each session, the leader of the group, Mrs. Hood, gathered the quilt, took it home, removed every backstitch and put the thread back in the right way. Mrs. Bee never knew about this act of grace.

So, who makes things right for me? And for you?
